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The Winter Building is a simple three-story brick building of early Italianate design. The building is of rectangular shape and has a low hipped metal roof. A projecting cornice is supported by brackets. At the ceiling line a row of dentils adorns the front and continues along the left side of the building.

Seven windows cross the front of the two upper floors. All windows except the central ones have flat lintels. The central window at the second and third floor levels are similar. The second floor window has a flat lintel and gives access to a small balcony, while the one at the third floor level has no balcony and the lintel is lightly pedimented. Both of these windows are flanked by flat square colonnettes.

There are eight windows on each of the two upper floors along the The spacing and proportion of these windows is excellent. west side. For some years the building had iron porticos or balconies at the second and third floor levels which provided a shed at the street level. balconies covered the front and west side of the building. They were added sometime between 1861 and 1874 and were removed in 1948.

The first floor has been altered to make room for shops and the interior of the first two floors has been rearranged. The exterior of the second and thirdfloors are unchanged except for the removal of shutters and the filling in of two windows.


The Winter Building is an excellent example of restraint and simplicity in a modest commercial building of its period. Immediately prior to and during the Civil Warsitchoused the Southern Telegraph Company. It was from there that the message was sent which result in the firing on Fort

The structure was built sometime between 1841 and 1843 by John Gindrat. Gindrat, a native of South Carolina came to Montgomery in the early 1820's by way of Georgia. In 1823 he began his mercantile business in Montgomery. A merchant, and cotton broker, he was instrumental in the development of commerce in early Montgomery. He was also the first president of the State Bank branch in Montgomery.

In 1854 Gindrat left the building to his daughter Mary Elizabeth Gindrat Winter. Her husband Joseph S. Winter handled the estate for her. Winter was also involved in the early development of the city.

During the first few months of the Confederacy, Montgomery served as its capital. It was at this time that the building housed the offices of the Southern Telegraph Company on its second floor. From there Leroy Pope Walker, Secretary of the War of the Confederate States sent the telegram to General P. T. G. Beauregard, Commander of the Confederate forces in Charleston, which resulted in the firing on Fort Sumpter, the immediate incident which precipitated hostilities between the North and the South.

The building has remained in the hands of the family and is currently used as clothing stores and offices.
